
Dear Parents and Students

'Australia: Story Country' is the theme for Book Week this year, where once again, we celebrate the latest Australian contributions to literature and the tradition of storytelling. Book Week will be celebrated in Week 5 this term, Monday 22 August to Friday 26 August.

The Children's Book Council of Australia is a not for profit organisation which promotes enjoyment of literature for young Australians. Each year they select recent books of merit in a range of categories. The Junior School will focus on two categories: Early Childhood and Picture Book of the Year. 





Classes will enjoy a variety of fun team challenges in the Library, designed to connect students to the Shortlisted Books and to the Book Week theme. - Read with your child. Revisit some old favourites from your childhood and share why you enjoy them.
- Talk with your child about the importance of reading. Why is reading significant to you? Ask them to share with you what they like about reading.

We look forward to celebrating an enjoyable and entertaining Book Week. It is a lovely opportunity to rediscover the simple pleasures of reading and the power of stories.
